"I've also worked on reexpedition to Antarctica search projects in Alaska and Russia and in Australia in from Australia, Canada, the Pilbara and the Simpson

Cronulla men arrested after raid

TWO men have been arrested during an investigation into the supply of cocaine in Miranda.
